Skills Centre of Excellence officially opened

We welcomed MSP Angela Constance, Cabinet Secretary for Education and Lifelong Learning, to officially launch our Skills Centre of Excellence based at Irvine Royal Academy on Wednesday 18 February.

From August 2015 secondary pupils in fourth, fifth and sixth years at North

Ayrshire schools will be able to access a range of vocational courses at our new Skills Centre of Excellence as well as at other campuses.

The College will work with employers to ensure the courses provided at the Skills Centre of Excellence are influenced by the needs of the local economy.

SKILLS CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE



Courses in hospitality and tourism, sport, care, construction and engineering will help young people develop the skills required by employers in these areas.

The groundbreaking facility is responding to the Scottish Government's Developing the Young Workforce strategy and is a shining example of how schools, colleges and businesses can work together.

£400,000 was spent by the College to develop the Skills Centre, and finance was also received from the Scottish Funding Council (£350,000) and Skills Development Scotland (£50,000).

We also received a £100,000 grant - the maximum amount available - from the Edge Foundation Innovation and Development Fund. Ayrshire

College was the only further education provider in Scotland to obtain this grant.

North Ayrshire Council has also committed a figure in excess of £1 million to facilitate the establishment of the Skills Centre and in developing the main school.

The partnership of business, college, schools and council is a wonderful example of the benefit in offering more and varied routes through education.

SKILLS CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

Apprentice demonstrates value of the Skills Centre of Excellence

Dale Dunlop, 18, left Irvine Royal Academy last year and is now a Modern Apprentice working at TPS Weldtech. In his sixth year, in addition to working towards an Advanced Higher at school, he undertook an engineering course at Ayrshire College.

Dale's story illustrates the ethos of the Skills Centre of Excellence and demonstrates what can be achieved by schools, colleges and employers working together.

"I managed to combine a Performing Engineering Operations (PEO) course at the College with school work at Irvine Royal Academy. It worked out great for me; both the school and the College were great with the arrangement and flexible with my time.

"I was looking through my options at school and it wasn't really suiting what I was good at. I'm a lot more hands-on than academic. I prefer a tool in my hand to a pencil.

"So I had a look at the College website to see what they were offering. The PEO came up and through the school and the College I was able to do both – which was the best of both worlds. I got to do the design work at school and came here for the practical stuff.



"The college offered a lot more engineering-related classes. It's a step up from school where you're almost exclusively doing woodwork. School gives you that taster and then obviously the College helps you go a lot more in-depth with it. There were four others from my school who did the same as me – and I know a couple of them have gone onto apprenticeships and jobs. So it's worked out well for most of us.

"I'm with TPS Weldtech in Kilmarnock. I'm enjoying it. I can't complain at all. It's what they told me it was - it's exactly as it said on the tin. It takes time to learn everything but I'm getting there and I'm happy with it.

"Longer term, I'm possibly looking to move towards the oil rigs. I'll need to see in the years to come, but right now I'm happy with the company I'm with and hopefully once I'm time-served I'll be staying with them."

Hairdressers to help tackle domestic violence

Students from hairdressing and beauty therapy courses are to be trained to spot and tackle the signs of domestic abuse in a pioneering initiative being piloted at Ayrshire College.

The charity organisation Medics Against Violence are rolling out workshops to the beauty industry and Ayrshire College students are learning to recognise and suspected domestic abuse and help signpost women to support services.

Marla Baird, Equality and Inclusion Manager at Ayrshire College said "It's a grim fact that one in four women will be affected by domestic violence

in their lifetime, and that many women don't feel able to tell anyone about this. Hair and beauty salons offer an opportunity to spot the signs of abuse and advise women on what help is available."

DELOITTE CHAIRMAN URGES AYRSHIRE WOMEN TO ACHIEVE THEIR DREAMS

Our accounting and business students were thrilled to welcome Deloitte Chairman David Cruickshank and Angela Mitchell, a partner at the accountancy firm, for a special motivational talk focusing on gender equality within the workplace.

The 30-minute presentation highlighted the many exciting opportunities available to women in business. The talk was part of the 'Equality Across the Board' series of debates, co-ordinated by Speakers for Schools in partnership with The 30% Club.

David is a member of The 30% Club - a group that launched in the UK in 2010 with a goal having 30% of FTSE-100 boards comprised of

women by the end 2015. When they started, 12.6% of board members were female, that figure is now up to 23%.

The pair spoke to the students and college staff about the challenges women have faced to make it into high profile positions. They encouraged staff and students to see their potential in leadership positions.

The mainly female audience of over 50 students had the opportunity to put questions to David and Angela on a wide range of topics.

David Cruickshank was elected Chairman of Deloitte in 2007. After his talk, he said "I just hope we have managed to remove some of the

invisible barriers that there are, and that women ask questions like 'why can't I do that?' or 'maybe I should look at doing this instead of something else'. In a short session, you can't influence a person's life chances but I hope we've opened some doors."


CoderDojo is part of a global network of free computer coding clubs for young people. At the sessions, 11-17 year olds learn how to code, develop websites, mobile phone apps, programmes and games in a fun and social environment.

There are many benefits to the club. Young people gain first hand exposure to what a career in ICT offers, while at the same time, providing them with the skills and confidence they need to become a great programmer in a safe, fun and sociable environment at the College. As well as staff mentors, the project involves college computing students acting as mentors.

The club aims to promote computer science and technology in a fun, thought-provoking and inspiring way, encouraging young people to consider studying computing and recognise the rewarding opportunities available in the rapidly expanding ICT industry.


Lorraine Johnston, Curriculum Manager for Business & IT said

Ayrshire College becomes an official Civil Aviation Authority exam site



OUR AYR CAMPUS HAS BEEN RECOGNISED BY THE CIVIL AVIATION AUTHORITY (CAA) AS AN OFFICIAL EXAMINATION CENTRE.

The CAA oversees the safety of all UK aviation industry activity on behalf of the European Aviation Safety Agency (EASA).

The College Aeronautical Engineering team has been providing training and support to day release students from various airlines for a number of years.

By becoming an examination centre, the College is now just the fourth site in the UK – and the only site in Scotland - that people in

the aviation industry can sit their Aircraft Maintenance Licence exam.

To be employed as an Aircraft Maintenance Licenced Engineer requires four years of academic study, on-the-job training and successful completion of a series of exams to gain the appropriate qualifications.

This latest development for the College is a result of strong industry connections and exceptional teaching standards. Representatives from the CAA arrived from their Gatwick headquarters to the College's Ayr campus for a tour of the facilities. The classrooms proved to be

ideal for their needs – as they are looking to progress from paper-based to web-based exams.

The CAA's EASA Part 66 Aircraft Maintenance Engineer exam will take place at the College's Ayr campus.

Seven secondary schools in East Ayrshire were challenged in November by leading architectural practice Keppie Design to design an inspirational, flexible and open learning space for Ayrshire College's new Kilmarnock campus.

'Interaction' is an enterprise education challenge, in its second year, which allows youngsters in East Ayrshire to learn skills and attitudes to help prepare them for the world of work. The College is acting as a client for the pupils as they aim to propose original ideas for the new campus,

currently being built at Hill Street.

The winning design was judged to come from Cumnock Academy students. Billie-Jean Findleton, Craig Laird, Luke McBlain, Aiden McGregor and Douglas Robertson showcased their concept in a presentation to Ayrshire College's New Campus Project Board.

Ryan Sylvester, divisional director and head of the team working on the new college from Keppie Design, said "The new college building is a fantastic example of an open, interactive and collaborative learning environment. In line with the core philosophy of Interaction, each school is invited to propose a design solution to the set challenge.

"The winning design will form the basis of the solution which the college team will implement, with the winning team remaining part of the process."



Easter work placements at Community Windpower Ltd



TWO OF THE COLLEGE'S WIND TURBINE TECHNICIAN STUDENTS ARE BEING OFFERED AN INCREDIBLE WORK EXPERIENCE PLACEMENT WITH COMMUNITY WINDPOWER LTD.

The lucky pair will be based at the energy company's headquarters in Cheshire for a fortnight over the

Easter break and will be focusing on the pre-planning side of a project in week one before joining the operational technical team in week two.

Over half the class of 26 applied for the roles and interviews were conducted by Community Windpower Ltd representatives at the end of February.

As well as giving the chosen duo a wonderful experience working as part of a team in the wind power industry, the placement will aim to increase their knowledge of the sector as well as exposing them to a range of different industry-standard programmes.

Ben Fielding, Project Manager at Community Windpower Ltd said "For the pre-planning stage, crucially, we give them a blank site. So instead of them copying they've got to think for themselves about the environmental constraints, access to the site. At the end of the week they're asked to produce a small report and do a presentation to the project team.

"In the second week they move onto the operational team. They'll get a flavour of all the bits of the process, and on one of the days they'll get to go onto a fully-functional wind farm."

Magnificent Women and their Flying Machines

OUR AERONAUTICAL ENGINEERING TRAINING CENTRE PROUDLY HOSTED A 'MAGNIFICENT WOMEN AND THEIR FLYING MACHINES' EVENT IN DECEMBER, WHICH AIMED TO GET GIRLS THINKING ABOUT A CAREER IN ENGINEERING.

Nearly forty second year pupils from schools across South Ayrshire arrived at the College to take part in activities organised in collaboration with Dumfries House Education and the Women's Engineering Society.

The Girls Into Engineering event was the Scottish Launch of the Women's Engineering Society's national outreach programme for schools.

On arrival, the girls were divided into three teams and given a tour of our aerospace facilities. They then heard a talk from female engineer Linda Relly from GE Caledonian and took a historical look at prominent women in aerospace and aviation over the past century.

The teams were challenged to build a STIXX aircraft wing

replica, becoming project managers, designers, production staff and planners and replicating the roles played by female aviation engineers during the First World War.

Ayrshire College aeronautical engineering student Dilyan Dunlop has been awarded the Ayr Guildry Apprentice of the Year award.

Dean of the Ayr Guildry voluntary group, Michael Hitchon MBE, presented Dilyan with his award at the College's Ayr campus.

The Ayr Guildry dates back to 1325, making it the oldest voluntary organisation in the West of Scotland. They have around 120 members.

Mr Hitchon said "I'm particularly keen that we emphasise the craft side of things, because Ayr

It is hard to believe that local MSP Willie Coffey marked the 25 per cent completion stage as recently as December! Construction work has now been going on at the site for 39 weeks.


On track for a May 2016 completion, the campus on Hill Street will replace the Holehouse Road campus. The building will boast sector-leading facilities for sport and science, technology and engineering and will also have a vibrant learning mall with a casual dining restaurant, health and wellbeing centre, hair and beauty salon and a learning resource centre.

Andrew Baillie, the College's New Campus Technical Adviser, said "The steelwork is well underway and the skeleton of the building is rising from the ground. Over the coming months the building will put its jacket on, as blockwork and cladding starts being installed. Our main contractor is making very good progress on site and we're on schedule."






Social media


